What's going on with the world's species?

Around the world, populations of species of plants and animals are shrinking and going extinct at a faster pace than ever before. As human populations expand into existing habitats, they displace the plants and animals living there.

- The number of land animals has fallen by 40% since 1970
- Marine animal populations have also fallen by 40%
- 40% of the world's 11,000 bird species are in decline

- About a quarter of the world's coral reefs have already been damaged beyond repair

How can you help save our environment?

- Reduce overall consumption
- Reduce your use of energy and contribution to climate change
- Reduce your water consumption
- Do not consume wildlife products, especially those that are illegal
- Reduce pollution
- Prevent plastic pollution
- Protect habitat
